## Foreword

**B** ack in the late 1960s, one of the few white churches to get behind our emerging Voice of Calvary ministry in Jackson, Mississippi, was pastored by a twentysomething young man named David Bryant. Now, nearly thirty years later, I have the privilege of commending to you wholeheartedly his latest book, *Messengers of Hope*.

Let me say right up front, I share with David an increasing hope that a genuine biblical revival is about to unfold in our nation. As we've discussed at National Prayer Committee meetings (which David chairs and on which I serve), the Spirit of God is obviously at work to that end. Already early stages of this revival can be seen in national stirrings among Christian teens, in renewal initiatives like the great Promise Keepers men's events, in new expressions of commitment toward racial reconciliation and healing in the church, in the creative urban ministries for Christ taking shape in our major cities, and in widespread movements of united prayer for revival and spiritual awakening.

David Bryant has been in the thick of these developments for nearly twenty years. Truly, he is what this book is titled: a Messenger of Hope. More specifically, through his Concerts of Prayer International, David and his team have made a significant difference. The most exciting urban ministries I see today are based on and nourished by Concerts of Prayer gatherings and united prayer events. For example, David and his staff have focused for years on New York City, helping the prayer movement there become a model for others who want to seek God for the four great spiritual needs of our cities: revival in the church, reconciliation among the races, reformation of society, and reaching the lost.



But as David writes, one such "messenger" is not enough. I agree with him: "The time has come to flood our nation with Messengers of Hope." Many, both clergy and laypeople—reconciled across race and denomination—must help spread the news of God's great promises to us in Christ for spiritual awakening in our land. To be sure, the Holy Spirit is the primary Agent of Revival. But in every one of America's great awakenings in the past three hundred years, he has been pleased to use men and women who gave themselves to join the Holy Spirit as his agents of revival.

In fact, one of the unique contributions of *Messengers of Hope* is David's acknowledged indebtedness (as a White author) to the historic African-American church as a rich depository of God-centered hope and a message of hope. As you'll discover, he begins each chapter by quoting extensively from Black Christian leaders over the past two hundred years, who again and again reassure us that biblical hope empowers, enriches, and transforms any generation. There's no doubt that many African-American believers today are poised to be agents of revival for the whole body of Christ. What an incentive to keep working at racial reconciliation.

Following on the heels of its companion volume (*The Hope at Hand: National and World Revival for the Twenty-First Century*), *Messengers of Hope* lifts up the vision for revival, lays out the biblical rationale for being messengers of this hope, and inspires all of us to take strong initiatives, under Christ, to be God's agents of revival. But David gives us more. The second half of his book spells out, in the most practical ways, how every Christian can fulfill his or her calling to be such an agent in a variety of settings. There's something here for everyone.

It is my hope and prayer that I will yet see, with my own eyes, the full spiritual awakening for which many of us have labored for decades. I firmly believe I will! But it will not come without hope-filled messengers. Daily I seek to be one of them. And *you* can be one of them too. David Bryant will show you how.
